I write to express to you my feelings against many of your actions in recent months.

My skin is white and I am the mother of two Atlanta physicians and a pharmacist. One of my doctor sons belongs to a private club and his children swim in a private pool, which, of course, is closed to your negroes. The pharmacist son cannot afford to belong to a private club, therefore his six children

special rights for negroes at the expense of the rights of owners of private businesses and enterprises.

You are not an emancipator of negroes, but, in my opinion, you are a traitor to the whites of Atlanta as well as thousands of white children, and all of this because the negroes elected you mayor, and you are dependent upon them for any other office to which you may aspire.
