

Abram Invites U.N. Group To View Racial Amity Here

UNITED STATES, N.Y. — MARTIN B. ABRAM, president of the American U.N. subcommittee on discrimination, today invited the group to visit his native Atlanta at the close of their year "in the greater part of the country."

The visit to occur by the group in the Georgia capital is his own decision.

Abram said he wanted to show the subcommittee how Atlanta has Georgia and America in general.

The subcommittee will be the only subject of any of its visits. Abram said the group is to be invited by U.N. Commission on Human Rights, the Executive and Social Council and the General Assembly.

The subcommittee will be a team of eight men from various countries. Abram said he will try to make the trip. He will show the Soviet expert on the subject of racial discrimination how he would like to see other parts of the country.
