

If violence, rist and insurrection are excuseable and are supported by the specious reasoning of self-appointed, not elected, organizations then to whom and to what agency can the isolated citizen look for protection? If a government of laws cannot be depended upon to preserve the peace and tranquillity of the community then one must question its responsibility and a government without responsibility does not deserve the support of its citizens. This, then, is anarchy.
